Boomers

- Born after the war
- Idealistic
- Involvement and Community

Generation X

- Disaffected
- Individualistic
- Materialistic
- Anti Government

Millennials

- More accepting of diversity
- More Global in Orientation
- More Civic Minded than Gen X
- World View and Experience
- Voting

Digital Natives/Digital Immigrants

- Part of the Millennial Experience
- Argument: Digital Natives Grew Up with Technology—part of their culture and part of their way of acting and working (Prensky)
- Evidence that technology rewires their brain.

Technology & The Digital Native

- Technology is a ubiquitous part of their environment.
- It colors the culture
- It may “rewire” neural patterns.

Digital Immigrants

- WWII/Depression, Boomers and Gen X
- Technology was not part of our world until later
- Technology is not the natural thing for us
- We are used to certain kinds of interaction and community building
